
## **Global Support for Mine Action**

## **Trends**


Contributions for Mine Action 2012-2016 in US\$ millions

Over the five-year period since 2012, **international support** to mine action peaked in 2012 at \$498.9 million, followed by a sharp decline over three years, but rose to \$479.5 million in 2016.



The top ten donors to mine action between 2012-2016 were: the United States, the European Union, Japan, Norway, the Netherlands, Germany, the United Kingdom, Switzerland, Australia, and Denmark.

The top ten recipients of mine action support between 2012-2016 were: Afghanistan, Iraq, Lao PDR, Cambodia, Colombia, Lebanon, Angola, South Sudan, Somalia, and Libya.

Donors and affected states

together contributed about US\$565 million to mine action in 2016 (last year of data available). 11 affected states reported contributions to their own national mine action program in 2016.

32 donors contributed to mine action in 2016.

The top five recipient states—Iraq,
Afghanistan, Croatia, Cambodia, and Lao PDR—
received 54% of all international contributions in 2016.

In 2016, 13 states received at least 20% more funding than in 2015.

Deliver Now: Commit the Resources to Finish the Job

- Casualties continue to occur, there were an average of nearly 24 per day in 2016.

- Too many victims lack access to the services they need.
